

#### The Somerset Arms

Since Wadworth Brewery gave up their long lease of the Somerset Arms in January 2018, Andy and Lyn Hobbs have successfully managed the pub with their food and drink offerings. Planning Permission has been granted for the Estate to increase the number of letting bedrooms to 17, including an updated kitchen, a new skittle alley, improved beer garden and parking, and to generally modernise the pub for the Maiden bradley community. This work will be undertaken in phases. The first phase is now underway to re-roof the old skittle alley so that bedrooms and bathrooms can be created in that building, with internal works to the main building and the new skittle alley to follow in 2020.

To facilitate this work the pub will be closed from 1st October with a re-opening scheduled for late 2020.

Eventually the Somerset Arms will be run by a company linked to the Estate and we look forward to providing an attractive and affordable place for villagers to meet and enjoy.

## Bishop's Letter-Remembering our future

'Little Imber on the down; seven miles from any town'. Like its better-known counterpart in Dorset, Tyneham, the 'lost' village of Imber was permanently evacuated in 1943, to provide a training area for US troops preparing for the allied invasion of Europe: one community's quiet sacrifice for the war effort. Deserted and overgrown, today Imber is a kind of ghost village, about as deep into Salisbury Plain as it is possible to be.

Adapted as a stage set for army manoeuvres, with the well-preserved parish church of St Giles as its centrepiece, Imber has also become something of a pilgrimage site for thousands of visitors who flock there during the twenty days each year access is granted. What draws them in such numbers? Abandoned places retain a unique fascination and Imber is, for many, a potent symbol of lost community - what the writer Georgina Boyes called 'the imagined village'. In this idealised and deeply nostalgic sense of place, the Anglican Church plays an almost iconic role — when the bells of St Giles toll, we are recalled to a longed-for common life.

The loss of place is perhaps the most powerful motive in modern social and political life. Globally, more people than ever before are uprooted from their home, by war and disaster; across the United Kingdom we are deeply unsettled and – whatever our allegiances- view the coming months with profound concern. Like the Psalmist, who writes 'in time of national humiliation' that 'we do not see our emblems' – the symbols of our belonging- as believers we are called by God to remember our future. Called back to the Lord's faithful provision in former generations and forward in hope to the place assured for us – won for us – in the Lord lesus.

Everyone is, by different routes, seeking this way forward. As an enduring sign of faith, hope and communal resilience, our parishes and churches once again have a crucial part to play in signalling and settling the nation. In Christ is our way back- and our way forwards.

## Police Community Volunteers working on behalf of the Wiltshire Police and Maiden Bradley



Welcome to Community Speed Watch News, compiled and produced by the Maiden Bradley Community Speed Watch Volunteers to keep the village aware of our activities.

The Speed Watch Teams go live in the 1st week of October having at last completed all the requirements to become a CSW Team. We now have been issued with our own device for checking vehicle speeds. This is a great advantage as we do not have to share with another CSW team.

You will have already noticed the yellow Speed Watch Are signs have appeared in the village. They are there to remind and advise drivers that the speed limit is 30mph.

The three teams will be working in 5 different locations around the village at times most suitable to traffic conditions. Please respect them there are carrying out their voluntary duties. Not to book as many vehicles as possible.

They are there to draw the driver's attention to remain in the given speed limit and be aware if they do not do so they will be reported.

Each month we will publish results from both the speed watch activities and data from the SID. Also we will publish any anecdotes incidents amusing or otherwise that occur during the month.

We are always looking for volunteers to help with the CSW operations so if you feel and would like to help please contact a member of the team or visit the CSW table in the village hall on the 5th October at the consultation.

Finally statistics show that the majority of drivers caught in CSW areas are local people who live in the area.

## Vacancy on the Parish Council! Being a Councillor

Maiden Bradley Parish Council needs a new team member; if you think you would like to take the wishes of the Parish Plan forward are over 18 years of age contact the Clerk on 01985213436 or email maidenbradley@virginmedia.com for an application form.

## What is a councillor?

Councillors are elected to represent an individual geographical unit on the council, known as a ward or- parish – in Maiden Bradley it is the entire parish. They are generally elected by the public every four years, but there is a Co-option space available on the Parish Council at the moment as Councillor Patrick Nixon has given his resignation to the Parish Council.

#### What do councillors do?

Councillors have three main components to their work.

- 1.Decision making Through meetings and attending committees with other elected members, councillors decide which activities to support, where money should be spent, what services should be delivered and what policies should be implemented.
- 2.Monitoring- Councillors make sure that their decisions lead to efficient and effective services by keeping an eye on how well things are working.
- 3.Getting involved locally- As local representatives, councillors have responsibilities towards their constituents and local organisations. These responsibilities and duties often depend on what the councillor wants to achieve and how much time is available, and may include:
- •Going to meetings of local organisations such as the Rural Police Neighbourhood Tasking Group
- •Going to meetings of bodies affecting the wider community (The Warminster Area Board)
- •Taking up issues on behalf of members of the public

## How much time does it take up?

Quite often councillors say that their duties occupy them for about five to 21 hours a week. Obviously there are some councillors who spend more time than this- and some less, but in the main, being a, parish councillor is an enjoyable way of contributing to your community, and helping to make it a better place to live and work.

As a councillor representing your community you will help keep it a great place to live and work. You will be supported in your role and will be expected to undertake training. You should be comfortable working electronically. You should have a positive outlook and a can-do attitude and be willing to work as part of a team. If after reading this notice you are interested in applying please contact the clerk to the council using the above details.

The closing date for applications to be received by the Clerk is the 7th October 2019.

## Have you signed up to Community Messaging?

Wiltshire Police use an email alert system called Community Messaging, also known as Neighbourhood Alert, across Wiltshire and Swindon to provide real time information to subscribing residents and businesses.

This is a free service and once subscribed you can choose what sort of alert to receive and how to receive them. This way the alerts will be tailored specifically to your interests and delivered by email, text or phone.

Community Messaging allows Wiltshire Police, and carefully selected partners, to help keep communities better informed about police and crime updates affecting their local area. The messages can even be sent to individual postcodes.

Although Wiltshire Police is the main source of information the system is also used by Dorset and Wiltshire Fire and Rescue, Wiltshire and Swindon Neighbourhood Watch, Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner, Gas Emergency Service and Action Fraud (the national centre for fraud and cybercrime). All these partners provide relevant information to help keep you safe and secure.

You can respond directly to messages and rate the value/relevance of alerts on a scale of 1-5. Your feedback can be most useful to provide first hand intelligence relating to alerts but also to allow us to assess the effectiveness of the system so we keep messages and alerts relevant.

The relevance of alerts is controlled by users through the selection of specific schemes on the system; Neighbourhood watch is one popular choice but there are also groups for Community Speed Watch, Youth Clubs and Groups, Church Watch, Horse Watch, Farm Watch and many others. All can be selected or deselected as required and all have the ability for you to feed intelligence to crime prevention partners.

It should be emphasised that Community Messaging is not a way of reporting crimes - always

call 999 in an emergency or 101 in a non-emergency situation.

Community Messaging doesn't replace the social media activity that the force uses to reach out to communities but works alongside it to make sure that messages are received in a timely way. With changes to the algorithms that the leading social media platforms use to distribute information you are possibly seeing far fewer of the posts issued than you did five years ago.
