### COMMUNITY GARDEN - MARCH 2018

We welcome back Franck Baudrain from his recent lengthy trip on duty in Africa, I am sure we shall hear more of his exploits there in due course.

However, we return to fact that spring approaches and there is the need to get out and do a bit of gardening as the days seems to be warmer and certainly the daylight hours are lengthening. We welcome our new gardeners and we hope to see you with your garden tools in action as we approach the planting season. Franck has a plan for the seeds order and if you are member of the group and fancy something a bit different to grow, drop him an email at <u>franckbaudrain@hotmail.com</u>.

We shall plan a get together at some point soon, it is likely we will need to be prepared for variable weather. Therefore maybe a BBQ in Wellies will be the order of day and if necessary we can have a brew in the poly tunnel. All are welcome and a donation will be expected for the BBQ rations. We would be pleased show you around if you have not previously visited us and like the idea of growing your own or just having a wander round this quiet place.

Regarding the poly tunnel, we have started planting, a row of first early potatoes, ambitious but we may have some new potatoes by the end of April. We have also sown Radish (French Breakfast) Lettuce (Little Gem) and Rocket with the expectation we will have an early crop of these salads. One or our team has already sown courgette seed, which are germinated and these will go into the border for cropping until June. With successional sowing we cropped courgettes up until October last season.

The vintage Hayter mower which has served us for 6 years, around the garden for rough cut mowing has expired after a total of 50 years of work since 1968. However, this fault is a minor setback apparently and it may be back in service for another 50 seasons after an engine transplant. We have acquired a fairly decent strimmer and the appropriate strimmer cord. The machine is currently being serviced and made ready for the coming season as well.

The plans are interesting for the garden and we are keen to equip each plot with gravel boards to keep the weeds and moles at bay and to hold the soil back as with regularly manuring we have significant land rise. Contributions to this cause we would be grateful for or Second hand building/scaffolding planks 3 metres or more in length would be ideal we need 8 for each plot.

The installation of two ponds in the garden to encourage wild life is shortly to happen, if we have any budding environmentalist who would like to help Franck please make contact with him.

The top end of the garden we know as the meadow, is quite fallow, and we have plans to top the field area this spring but ideally it needs to be grazed off, any orphan lambs perhaps? We will then sow it with wild flower seeds and then top it again in September. The plan being to encourage the insect population, particularly bees, with flowering wild plants. We have an ambition to have some bee hives in the garden when the habitat has been established.

Lastly and where you can help us, we want to create a herbaceous border across the garden and to do this we want perennial plant roots, that you may have divided and thrown part away to compost. All additions gratefully received however some idea of what they are would be useful, drop them around to the Community Garden, if the gate is locked from the inside then leave outside. However, we do not want Macleaya or Japanese Knot Weed or any plants which are known to be invasive and notifiable. We could do with 30metres of 12 mm garden hose. Couple of loads of FYM well-rotted funds are available for the purchase. Lots of help from more gardeners or those who just want to exercise rather than going to the gym.

#### For the sponge:

200g/7oz soft dried pitted dates, roughly chopped 200ml/7fl oz water from a freshlv boiled kettle 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda 75g/21/2oz unsalted butter, softened, plus more for greasing 2 tbsp black treacle 50g/1¾oz dark muscovado sugar 2 large free-range eggs, at room temperature 150g/51/20z plain flour 2 tsp baking powder For the sauce

150g/5<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>oz unsalted butter, softened 300g/10<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>oz dark muscovado sugar 1 tbsp black treacle 200ml/7fl oz double cream, plus more to serve

### Sticky Toffee Pudding

Recipe Tips

t shouldn't be eaten piping hot, b it cut from the dish tastes like the st magnificent sticky gingerbread.



- 1. Preheat the oven to 180C/160C Fan/Gas 4 and lightly grease your dish.
- 2. Put the chopped dates, boiling water and bicarbonate of soda into a bowl, stir and then leave for 10 minutes.
- 3. Cream the butter and black treacle together in a stand mixer until well mixed, then add the sugar and mix again, beating out any lumps. Beat in an egg and keep beating - scraping down as necessary - until completely incorporated, then do the same with the other egg. Beating more gently, add the flour and baking powder until you have a smooth, thick batter.
- 4. Using a fork, stir the soaked dates, squishing them a bit, then pour the dates and their liquid into the batter and beat gently to mix in.
- 5. Pour and scrape into your prepared dish or cake tin and bake for 30–35 minutes, or until a cake tester comes out clean.
- Meanwhile, to make the sauce, melt the butter, muscovado sugar and 6. treacle over a very low heat in a heavy-based saucepan. Once the butter's melted, stir gently until everything else is melted too. Now stir in the cream, then turn up the heat and when it's bubbling and hot, take it off the heat.
- 7. As soon as it's out of the oven, prick the cooked sponge pudding all over with a cocktail stick and pour about a guarter of the warm sauce over, easing it to the edges with a spatula so that the sponge is entirely topped with a thick sticky glaze. Put a lid on the remaining sauce in the pan to keep it warm.
- 8. Leave the pudding to stand for 20–30 minutes, then take to the table, with the rest of the sauce in a jug, and cream to serve.

### Annual Planning and Transportation Seminar Dark Night Skies— the facts you *really* need to know

ACHIEVING tangible benefits from dark night skies will be the message delivered at the latest planning seminar organised by Cranborne Chase Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB). A quintet of inspirational and distinguished speakers will reveal why dark night skies are vital for human and animal wellbeing, how a darker environment can lead to boundless benefits, and how you can help the AONB to achieve prestigious International Dark Sky Reserve status for the benefit of all.

The event, held on Tuesday 20 March at Dinton Village Hall (SP3 5EB), is being aimed at policy and development management planners, landscape architects, tourism and biodiversity officers, lighting engineers and community health officers in public service and commercial consultancy, together with developers and their agents, health practitioners, and community members and local and parish councillors.

### The speeches and the speakers :

### Bob Mizon/Speech: What are Dark Night Skies?

Bob Mizon is a co-ordinator of the British astronomical Association's Commission for Dark Skies, which aims to turn back the tide of light pollution that has seriously affected night skies for more than 50 years. He was elected a Fellow of the Royal Astronomical Society in 1985, and has been associated with the Wessex Astronomical Society in various offices for many years. In 2010 Bob, a former French teacher, was awarded an MBE for his work in astronomy and environmental education. He is a STEM\* Ambassador, seeking opportunities to bring astronomy to adult and young people's groups in the south. More than 136,000 people have experienced a tour of the universe via Bob's mobile planetarium, which he takes into schools.

#### *Prof Martin Morgan-Taylor/Speech: Why are dark night skies important?*

Martin Morgan-Taylor, Associate Professor Leicester De Montfort Law School and Vice President International Dark Sky Association 2011-2013, researches the legal impact of light pollution, namely the wasted carbon emissions and wasted money from wasted light, harm to human and animal health, as well as the loss of the night sky and the creation of dark sky places. He also acts as a consultant to Defra. He has received several awards for his dark sky work, including the Joy Griffiths Award (2007) and the Galileo Award (2011) for legal efforts to protect the night sky from light pollution.

### Sean Beer/Speech: The benefits of DNSs to wildlife, human health, carbon savings and tourism

Sean Beer is a Senior Academic in the Faculty of Management, Department of Tourism and Hospitality at Bournemouth University. This involves teaching, consultancy, research, publication and broadcasting. His principle research interests include rural business, society and development. Sean has been awarded a Rotary Foundation Scholarship, a Winston Churchill Fellowship and he is a Nuffield Scholar. He is also a regular commentator on rural and environmental matters on the radio and television.

#### Duncan Wise/Speech: Making it all happen

Duncan Wise is Visitor Development & Marketing Manager for Northumberland National Park Authority, responsible for destination marketing, visitor information, transport and travel and developing visitor experiences that are based on the Park's special qualities. These include nature-based and heritage-tourism, cycling and walking and, more recently, dark skies. Duncan was the Authority's lead officer on the joint collaboration with Kielder Water & Forest Park, securing the designation of International Dark Sky Park (Gold Tier) for both the National Park and most of Kielder Water & Forest Park in 2013. Since then he has worked with and supported local tourism businesses to make them more aware of the opportunities of developing astro-tourism experiences, and of promoting the installation of fully-shielded and appropriate outside lighting to minimise light pollution. Duncan is also a member of the International Dark Sky Association's Dark Sky Places Committee.

### Malcolm Mackness/Speech: Lightscape Management Plans - what are they and how to make them work

Malcolm Mackness spent most of his early professional life in the public lighting departments of Leicester City, Leicestershire and Wiltshire. For 20 years he was county lighting engineer in Gloucestershire. He was always an advocate of good lighting design and for many years was involved with presenting lighting training for the Institution of Lighting Professionals (ILP). In 1998 he moved to the private sector, joining Jim Paterson as a partner at Lighting Consultancy & Design Services in Coventry. Malcolm subsequently worked with Jim on the first UK Dark Sky project in Galloway Forest and following that on many more Dark Sky projects in England, Scotland and Wales. Although now semi-retired, Malcolm, who has a BA(Hons) from the OU and is an Associate of the ILP and an Incorporated Engineer, is continuing to assist with the Cranborne Chase bid for International Dark Sky Reserve status.

The seminar runs from 9.30am to 4.15pm. Tickets cost £48 [including VAT] and include lunch and refreshments provided by local caterer Mary Yorke.

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
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
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


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
