Two of the groups that need more help as they are large events, are the summer fair and especially the bonfire night.

As each group makes progress we will report this via the Parish Newsletter, parish Council website, noticeboards, Facebook etc.

Please remember these are the main things that the village as a whole asked for, and we need people who are self-starters to come forward and help to move these topics forward successfully!

The Parish Council is going to action an article a month on various subjects parishioners have highlighted in the Parish Plan. This month is the Countryside. *What constitutes a public right of way?*

A public right of way in the form of a footpath, bridleway, restricted byway, byway open to all vehicular traffic or a public road is a right that can be used by all members of the public. ... A private right may exist on the same line as a public right, but generally private rights of way exist separately. Can you walk on private land? The legal standpoint

You don't have automatic access to walk across agricultural or other private land, even if you think doing so wouldn't cause any damage. However, under the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000, there is a 'right to roam' over certain areas of land.

Is right of way a privilege?

Right of Way. An Easement, a privilege to pass over the land of another, whereby the holder of the easement acquires only a reasonable and usual enjoyment of the property, and the owner of the land retains the benefits and privileges of ownership consistent with the easement.

When you're out roaming on access land, you're responsible for your own safety and for making sure that your actions don't damage the people, animals or environment around you. Always stick to the Countryside Code so that you can enjoy, respect and protect the countryside.

Consider the local community and other people enjoying the outdoors, leave gates and property as you find them and remember to follow paths when you're not on open access land, protect the natural environment.

Leave no trace of your visit and take your litter home Keep dogs under effective control (Check out the Dog Walking Code on the Ramblers Website for more information about walking with a dog)

There's also advice in the Countryside Code for people managing the land, so that they know how to make it easy for visitors to act responsibly and how to identify possible threats to visitor's safety.

Respect the needs of local people and visitors alike – for example, don't block gateways, driveways or other paths with your vehicle.

When riding a bike or driving a vehicle, slow down or stop for horses, walkers and farm animals and give them plenty of room. By law, cyclists must give way to walkers and horse-riders on bridleways.

Co–operate with people at work in the countryside. For example, keep out of the way when farm animals are being gathered or moved and follow directions from the farmer.

Busy traffic on small country roads can be unpleasant and dangerous to local people, visitors and wildlife – so slow down and where possible, leave your vehicle at home, consider sharing lifts and use alternatives such as public transport or cycling. 

CRIMESTOPPERS

I am the volunteer chair of Wiltshire Crimestoppers, the County branch of Crimestoppers UK, a national charitable organisation that provides an anonymous crime reporting service throughout the Country. We work with County Police Forces to help reduce crime in our communities and to protect vulnerable individuals. Crimestoppers nationally runs a large number of campaigns each year educating the public about different crime types and appealing for information. The national website is <u>www.crimestoppers-uk.org</u>. should you want to find out more.

In Wiltshire, we are trying to increase our reach to the public with a number of initiatives to make our communities more aware of our service and encourage its use. We are also looking for volunteer 'Ambassadors' within individual parishes to help us stay aware of local issues and promote the use of the service. Public reporting of crime and anti-social behaviour using 999 or 101 is sometimes inhibited through fear of identification, and thus also of recrimination or reprisal. In providing a 100%-guaranteed anonymous reporting system through Crimestoppers using the number 0800 555 111, we hope to overcome those fears and thus make our communities safer for all. In the last year alone, anonymous reports of crime to Crimestoppers in our county have led to a number of convictions.

One of our our objectives this year is to make more people in Wiltshire, especially the more vulnerable members of our communities, aware of the Crimestoppers reporting service through the parish magazines of the County. We hope, for example, to keep the Crimestoppers logo and contact details constantly in the public eye through regular placements in publications such as these.

I am wondering, therefore, if you could please help us by providing the contact details of your local parish magazine editor(s) so that we can start making appropriate arrangements with them. If you were also able to promote the Crimestoppers service through your own offices or through your communications with the public from time to time when appropriate, you would be joining us in helping to make our communities safer.

Additionally, if you have any events that you wish for the Committee to support by presenting on what Crimestoppers do or delivering Crime prevention training, please do let me know.

Finally, as a volunteer Committee we are always looking for people to help our cause and kindly give us their time to make our communities safer; if you know of anyone who may be interested please do let me know. I would be most grateful to hear from you and for your help.

Not as expected.....

1216, when she was fifty-eight, Margaret Biset sold all her property and calling herself, 'the handmaid of the Lord' gave the proceeds to her childhood home, a poor leprosy hospital in Bradley that her father had founded to care for her mother in the year that Margaret was born. Margaret's friends were horrified and advised against it but Margaret was determined to turn her back on the world and serve God and the unfortunate women with Hansen's disease; all she asked in return was two pounds of pepper a year, a little house in the cloisters and a small annual pension.

Margaret's new home was still being built when King John died and the queen returned home to Angouleme leaving behind the infant princess Isabella. Margaret was summoned to be nursemaid to the baby. Margaret had spent most of her adult life caring for her brother's children and had been looking forward to a quieter life but had no choice but go to the royal court. When the time came for Isabella to be educated in courtly behavior Margaret stayed with her as her governess and gave her a far broader education. When Isabella was married to the cold hearted Holy Roman Emperor Frederick II only Margaret and one close attendant were allowed to follow Isabella into his harem. Life in the harem was grim the ladies were guarded by Arab eunuchs and kept alongside the Emperor's menagerie. Isabella wasn't even allowed to dine with her brother when he visited when returning from the Crusades but Margaret was summoned back to court to be governess to Henry III's new wife Eleanor who was only twelve.

A few days before her eightieth birthday, while praying in the middle of the night, Margaret heard an intruder and raised the alarm and saved the king from an assassin. Margaret lived to be eighty-three and died in Bordeaux soon after hearing that Isabella had died after giving birth to a daughter who she named 'Margaret.' The chronicle for 1242 recorded that 'Margaret Biset "died illustrious and morally pure"

Soon after Margaret's death the place that she had loved and wanted to return to became known as "MAIDEN BRADLEY."



Cranborne Chase Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty is one of 12 AONBs taking part in a 'Defra Tests and Trials' project called Farming for the Nation. The AONBs taking part will be testing new ways for Defra to incentivise environmentally friendly approaches to farming.

Cranborne Chase AONB will be organising a series of facilitated workshops to seek agreement on the public benefits of well-managed farmland:

- which of these benefits farmers would consider managing within a new stewardship scheme;
- how it fits in with the farm business; and,
- consider how to assess outcomes.

These workshops are open to any of the farmers within the AONB and other stakeholders such as Local Nature Partnerships/Health and Wellbeing Groups. Agreed Land Management Plans (LMP) will be co-created with six farmers for their landholdings with technical advice and support provided.
