EDITORIAL



Sincere thanks to His Grace the Duke of Somerset for providing his home for the Platinum Jubilee Big Lunch Party on Sunday 5th June. More thanks to Sarah and Angus Neish for hosting the Beacon Party and huge thanks to Jo Gilbert and her family for organising both Jubilee celebrations with such success.

As you will see from the collage of photos in this edition of the News, the event was enjoyed by many, the weather remained fine and we all toasted the Queen with bubbles and sang the National Anthem.

We returned home in time to see the highlights of the London events and the acknowledgement that Her Majesty keeps her marmalade sandwiches in her handbag.

On one of our bell ringing evenings in All Saints' Church, I decided to take a look at a leaflet for sale written in 1970 and at a cost of £1.50. I had no money on me so I have borrowed this 52 year old publication depicting an early history of the church and was curious to learn of the dates of the castings of the different bells. Bells 1 to 5 were all originally cast in the 1600's and bell six, the tenor, was cast in 1895. Apart from bells 4 and 6 the other bells all have inscriptions on them:

- Bell 1 – Treble** *Reverence my Sanctuary*
- Bell 2** *Give alms as thy ability and Holiness to the Lord*
- Bell 3** *I Serve*
- Bell 5** *Fear God and Love thy Neighbour*



There were three, now extant, charities in Maiden Bradley. Thomas Taylor was an Elizabethan ship's captain who died in 1621 leaving £150 in trust to buy winter fuel for folk in the village. Mary Brent, a daughter of Sir Henry Ludlow, a villager, created a similar trust in the eighteenth century and we have no date for Mr Harding who was a local farmer and Churchwarden who left £200 to provide income for those villagers over 65 years of age and in need.

Clearly, this booklet needs updating and reprinting and could be a good project for someone to undertake.

# The Maiden Bradley Climate Collective

Activating Maiden Bradley's Environmental Response



Summer is here and my garden is alive with insects and flowers and birds. It reminds me of how lucky we are to live somewhere so rural and beautiful and full of life – I even have a baby woodpecker visiting the bird feeders this year! Great Spotted Woodpeckers are on the decline, so it is really exciting that our local ones have bred. I have nesting swallows, sparrows and blue tits too!

Yet whilst we are lucky to live somewhere so beautiful, sometimes it can make the destruction being forced upon the environment elsewhere seem distant. I am reminded of how often things we buy and do in our everyday lives, have a potential darker environmental history we might not realise. One of these is the clothes we buy. The fashion industry is a terrible polluter. Whilst there are many sustainable and ethical brands out there, more starting all the time, it does not change the fact that new clothes = pollution and environmental destruction, both through the manufacturing process and how much disposable cheap fashion ends up in landfill. I am someone who loves fashion, I wrote my university thesis on fashion history and have collected clothes for many years. Yet whilst I have a ridiculously large wardrobe, I also have a sustainable one in that most of it is second hand... I have shopped in charity and second hand shops my whole life, and whilst I understand it is not everyone's cup of tea, it can mean amazing quality at cheap prices (I have even found Chanel before!). I haven't bought a new item of clothing in five years!

However in this time of the cost of living crisis even second hand clothes are not always affordable. So how can we update our wardrobes without spending in an environmentally friendly way? The answer is a Clothes SWISH and one is taking place in the village on 30<sup>th</sup> July at the Maiden Bradley Village Hall!

A Clothes SWISH is very simple. People bring clean decent quality clothes they know longer wear, donate them, and in exchange are free to take some clothes other people have donated. Essentially it is a clothing swap shop!

- Drop off clean good quality adult and children's clothes and shoes from 10 am on the 30<sup>th</sup> July.
- Come back at 1pm to swish away and enjoy refreshments with your neighbours whilst you "shop"!

## Parish Council 14<sup>th</sup> June 2022

**Scorpion Scheme** - The Parish Council has been asked to share the aims of a major police anti-drugs initiative, the Scorpion scheme. Philip R Wilkinson OBE, Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire and Swindon says 'The overall aim of the Scorpion series is to make the Southwest a hostile environment for criminal activity. Scorpion 2 will be an intelligence led, multi-agency operation, targeted against those drug dealers embedded in our communities and feeding the anti-social behaviour that blights the lives of many of our communities across the Southwest and elsewhere.'

Everyone is encouraged to feed any relevant information about suspicious drug-related activities to their neighbourhood policing teams email [WarminsterAreaCPT@wiltshire.police.uk](mailto:WarminsterAreaCPT@wiltshire.police.uk) or via the Crimestoppers website ([crimestoppers-uk.org](http://crimestoppers-uk.org)), which is anonymous.

### What is a councillor?

Councillors are elected to represent an individual geographical unit on the council, known as a ward or - parish – in Maiden Bradley it is the entire parish. They are generally elected by the public every four years, but there is a Co-option space available on the Parish Council at the moment.

### What do councillors do?

Councillors have three main components to their work.

1. Decision making - Through meetings and attending committees with other elected members, councillors decide which activities to support, where money should be spent, what services should be delivered and what policies should be implemented.
2. Monitoring - Councillors make sure that their decisions lead to efficient and effective services by keeping an eye on how well things are working.
3. Getting involved locally - As local representatives, councillors have responsibilities towards their constituents and local organisations. These responsibilities and duties often depend on what the councillor wants to achieve and how much time is available, and may include:

- Going to meetings of local organisations such as the Rural Police Neighbourhood Tasking Group
- Going to meetings of bodies affecting the wider community (The Warminster Area Board)
- Taking up issues on behalf of members of the public

You should be comfortable working electronically. You should have a positive outlook and a can-do attitude and be willing to work as part of a team. ## Message from Councillor Bill Parks



Many of our villages and much of the surrounding area lie within the Cranborne Chase Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB).

Recently, I attended a seminar given by the Cranborne Chase AONB regarding the designation as an International Dark-Sky Reserve (IDSR). Being only the world's 14<sup>th</sup> IDSR in October 2019, this was achieved after a rigorous assessment process, but was the designation was 'provisional' only and requires improvements in reducing the amount of spilled light, which has a detrimental impact on the darkness of the sky as well as on the wellbeing of nocturnal fauna and human health.

The international assessors of the IDSR require that 67% of all domestic and business outside lighting must meet Dark-Sky criteria. The sad fact is that the current level is assessed at between 15-20%.

If this is not addressed as a priority over the next 18 months, the Area could lose its Reserve status.

Reducing lighting is not just important to see the stars for those of us privileged to live in the AONB; it benefits Astro-tourism, attracting more visitors into the area and boosting the local economy. Reduced lighting protects insects and their predators, including bats. Too much blue light affects our circadian rhythms, may affect our own health and it kills insects.

The AONB officers can give businesses, farms and residents help in advising them on how to reduce light spill. You might want to think about the purpose of your lighting, timing of the lighting (does it need to be on all the time, and would a motion sensor be more appropriate?), character of the light provided, switching and controls

Feel free to contact them at [info@cranbornechase.org.uk](mailto:info@cranbornechase.org.uk). There are often very simple and cheap ways to reduce light spill, so don't be put off doing your bit to protect the IDSR.

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**COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH NEWS**  
**Police Community Volunteers working on behalf of**  
**the Wiltshire Police and Maiden Bradley**



**Community Speed Watch News. Produced by the Maiden Bradley Community SpeedWatch Volunteers to keep the village safe and aware of our activities.**

Activity in June has been lower than normal this Month with 6 sessions logging 474 vehicles counted and 16 vehicles booked for speeding over 35mph. Majority this month were cars and decrease to 3HGV's

The HGV traffic continues to remain the same as last month, based on the numbers logged during CSWactivity. During an average 60 minute CSW session in June 2022 it showed an HGV every 2.23minutes,or 699 HGV tonnes per hour through our village.

The HGV configuration remains similar, vehicles are either "26 tonne 3 axle, 32 tonne 4 axle rigidvehicles or 44 tonne 5 / 6 axle Articulated" With a maximum length of 16.5mtrs ( 54ft - 2ins)

Our New Traffic Enforcement Officer Scott Garcia has still not as yet appeared, I am fully assured that he is real and not a hologram. I am not, however, convinced. Upper Deverills have had a lot of police presence, end result their booking count has dropped to almost zero. So they have told the police to massively reduce their presence. So the CSW can book more. I leave you to work that one out.

It is Traffic Calming season again. Ours at the Mere end of the village was taken out early Sunday 12th May by a gentleman driving his camper van. It was an excellent job and took it off at ground level. Nobody hurt, the Camper van trashed. The Wiltshire Police and Wiltshire Council Highways respond very quickly to clear debris and protect traffic calming. First one in two years.

The second SID (Speed Indicator Device) Frome Road, High Street project progresses slowly as we arewaiting for Ringway the Contractor to forward the dates for installation.

As always, thank you Maiden Bradley Community for all your support of the Speed Watch Teams.

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
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
