Maiden Bradley Community Garden Down The Plot...


2022 has been a year of extreme weather challenges for all of us and we have felt it keenly down on the community garden. The start of the year gave us a trio of storms, and it continued with high temperatures, drought, an unseasonably warm autumn and a prolonged cold snap in December. Despite all these challenges we have had a hugely successful year in the garden, producing an abundance of crops. We have been picking veg and flowers throughout the year - from apples to zucchini (courgettes to you and me). These photos were taken in late November and as you can see we certainly didn't go hungry! Having fresh produce throughout the year isalways a great thing but it has been particularly useful recently when we have all been feeling the financial squeeze.

This coming year has a set of practical challenges for us. We are currently dismantling our very old and dilapidated greenhouse. Thankfully we have a replacement waiting in the wings, but we still need to lay a new base and figure out how to assemble the thing. Next on the agenda is the building of a series of brand new compost bays which will help to streamline the recycling of our garden waste, providing easy-access bays that are more efficient and accessible to all. Then we hope to improve our watering facilities by harvesting all the water we can from the available roof spaces and installing a new tap extension for access to the orchard and pond. All these things will help to future-proof us against weather extremes which we are being told will be the new norm.

If you would like to join us down the plot in 2023 please do get in touch. New members are welcome any time but our membership starts in January so that would be a perfect time to join. Membership entitles you to all the fruit and vegetables you can eat for you and your family. There is a greenhouse, a polytunnel, tools, wheelbarrows, seeds, compost and a mower available to all. We also have bees, a wildflower bank, a meadow, a pond and an orchard to enjoy.

Membership gives you year round access to a beautiful space where you can get some 'green exercise', socialise with other gardeners or find some peaceful solitude and take time to wind down. All that is required of you is to just spend some time working in the garden. You do not need any special skill. You can be an expert or a beginner - all are welcome.

We would also love some volunteers to help with the infrastructure projects, so if you don't want to join up but would like to offer your expertise please do let me know.

MAIDEN BRADLEY WEIGHT WATCHERS We've had a demonstration!

We had a meeting planned with Wiltshire Council, together with Chapmanslade and Corsley, for the 2nd December. to discuss our proposals for the introduction of experimental weight limits on the B3092, and the removal of weight limits on the B3089 to facilitate HGV movement westward from the A303/A350 junction.

But, citing the need to wait for new government guidelines in 2026, Wiltshire Council decided not to attend.

So, at 24 hours notice. we organised a demonstration!

We prepared a banner, placards, appealed to villagers, and got ITN West Country and BBC Points West to attend.

The results were amazing!

We crossed the road near the milk station at regular intervals, each crossing lasting for 3 minutes. The build up of traffic each time was staggering with queues backing up for 200-300 yards in reach direction.

Our protest was peaceful but although most drivers were supportive we had incidents with a lorry driver and 2 motorists who were very aggressive with the motorists attempting to drive at us.

At 12.30 we had our meeting attended by our M.P. Andrew Murrisson, and "empty chaired" Wiltshire Council (see opposite).

The results were that we had fantastic TV coverage from the media with one reporter saying" I've really enjoyed this", and with our M.P. saying that "enough is enough and that we have to stop HGV's coming through our village". To this end he has contacted the Leader of Wiltshire Council,

Richard Clewer, to arrange a meeting to get Wiltshire Council to act.

Thank you to everyone who supported us by turning out to demonstrate. We may need to do this again......

Happy Man No. 6 part 2 - The Memories of a Railway Man An Autobiography by Mike Herrin and his life on the railway.

Yeovil Junction Part Two.

Instead of going through the routine of days again. Published last Month. Let us take a look at one or two of the amusing incidents that happened.

One of our gang was in the habit of going to Sherborne, next station up the line, about once a fortnight on lates for a haircut. He lived in a lineside cottage up the line and used to ride his bicycle to work along the "Cess", a narrow path alongside the ballast, no longer around. Back then you were able to cycle from Penzance to Wick along a well maintained path and banks.



After his haircut he used to visit the local for a pint, on this occasion he visited the Yeovil Junction Buffet during the evening and had another. About 8:30pm the foreman decides to let him go home a bit early so he sets off up the line on his trusty bike, we thought nothing more about it, until the 8:50pm Up Bideford express goods roars through at about 60 mph, up into the cutting on towards Sherborne the engine whistles long and loud, then we hear her open up again accelerating away, all seems well.

Next day our man cycles into work, his arms and face a mass of scratches and bruises. What have you been about? someone asks him: Reply. Did you hear that Bastard on the Bideford, he came up behind I whistling as he passed the driver yelled put that Bloody Red light out!!! I looked up and rode right down the bank!!!!!! He had forgotten to turn the rear light on his bicycle off and in the dark the driver thought there was an emergency.



Same man, he was lovely. One night we were waiting for the arrival of the 5.52 Exeter-Waterloo and he decided to use the toilet, after he had gone in and a minute to settle, the foreman suggested a fire bucket of water tipped under the door may be a good idea. So I go and tip out the water and rush back out, "Shock" he is out there sitting on the Barrow with the foreman both in fits of laughter. Who had the water? In a few minutes out comes the old guy who used to sell newspapers up and down the platforms when the trains come in. His trousers soaked from the knees down. "Lots of water on the floor in there tonight" was all he said.

I remember making some overtime when Bertram Mills Circus came to Yeovil, they had their own trains and most of the animals arrived in one, we had to clean out and straw down the large bogie vans that the elephants travelled in. Elephant dung is like a huge football and it appeared to be mainly hay, not a very messy job actually. I remember going into the station in a very excitable mood saying there were elephants coming down the hill from the direction of the town, the foreman very politely!! said it would be alright. Of course the circus was over and the animals were making their way back to the station. When they were loaded and given some hay the wagons started to sway from side to side. I drew this to the attention of one of the circus workers, he said the time to worry was when the wagon stopped swaying as while it swayed they were content.

Although there are no statistics to report on CSW activity, being stood down until the 9th January 2023. Does not mean that CSW has been idle. It has given time to reflect, review CSW activities, our successes and areas that may need a different approach.

Following the various discussions and our meeting last night 14th December. It has enabled CSW to look forward to the New Year on a very positive note.

We were concerned that we did not have enough CSW members to operate an effective three sessions a fortnight operation. That has changed with the coming of two new members to the CSW team and one existing member returning to activity. This brings the group up to twelve members. A very big thank you to the two new members and the returned member.

With the Wiltshire Police approved operating sites 6 in number we have taken a serious look at these sites and re-arranged their priority for CSW activity. No doubt that these changes will become apparent when we restart activity.

The undoubted success of the SID (Speed Indicator Device) on Frome Road. has had a positive effect in traffic calming and quite rightly changed the CSW activity. A second one of the same type has been agreed for the church end of the village along with other improvements to the traffic calming in that

area. So you see the importance of gaining volunteers to spread the load.
