A RIGHT ROYAL SUCCESS FOR THE WYLVE VALLEY ART TRAIL!

In this Coronation season the Wylve Valley Art Trail is thrilled to announce that it has won the much-coveted Queen's Award for Voluntary Service, one of the last awards granted by Her Majesty before she died last September. Nick Andrew, founder and co-ordinator of the Trail, was presented with the award on Friday by Sarah Troughton, Lord Lieutenant of Wiltshire. The Trail, run entirely by volunteers, has brought art to this corner of Wiltshire for over 20 years, and has become a real fixture in the artistic calendar of the county.



The Royal connection goes on: furniture maker extraordinaire Matthew Burt, a veteran of the Wylve Valley Art Trail, has created an exquisite box that's to be sent to the King as a Coronation gift. Made of English burr elm with boxwood detailing, its Wiltshire sycamore interior is filled with artworks by artists taking part on the Trail – a gift truly fit for a king.

This year the Trail ran until 8th May in a delicious lozenge of creativity running from Westbury in the north to Donhead St Andrew in the south and from Steeple Langford in the east to Gasper in the west, and was chock-full of amazing art and artists. Is animal art what you're after, or does abstract attract? Would you like a piece of furniture or a piece of sculpture? How about handmade jewellery or handmade textiles? Do ceramics scintillate?

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RING FOR THE KING



Since my appeal in last month's Maiden Bradley News, I am pleased to report that we have received interest from the village regarding the skill of ringing Church bells. One of those who enquired had previous experience of bell ringing over fifty years ago and very quickly has slotted into our band. Her skills were quickly recovered as we fast tracked Sara into a bell ringing tour 29th April.

We had been invited to ring at Wells Cathedral and we rang there for service on Saturday morning, followed by, a ring in a private garage at North Wooton, then on to East Pennard which has the heaviest ring of 5 bells in the country, on then to Ditcheat to ring the finest 8 bells in the world, lunch at The Den, John Thorners, on then to Chilcompton and a ring of 12 bells; on then to Mathew Higby's works at Holcombe. Higby are a well-known bell hangers and engineers and we had a tour of the work and his own ring of 8 bells the heaviest being 2cwt. The next stop being the ring of 8 bells at Marston Bigot near Frome and quite delightful to ring then finally The Bradley Hare for much refreshment. A splendid day out for 14 ringers associated to Maiden Bradley and our grateful thanks to Sam Shead (Captain) of Bells at Wells Cathedral for organising the visits.

Therefore by the end of the tour Sara was flying, and her confidence renewed, and since, The Salisbury Guild of Ringers have approved her full membership to the bells of All Saints, Maiden Bradley.

That said, Sara joined our band, as did the following: David Puckey (Capt), Pat Kennedy, (Vice Capt), Kate Moore, Sara Keith, Mel Cooper, and James Kennedy to Ring for the King between 10:15 and 10:45 on Coronation Day.

Further to help out other towers over the Coronation weekend some of us went to St Denys, The Minster Church in Warminster and the church of St Peter and St Paul, Longbridge Deverill to "Ring for the King"

Mission accomplished.

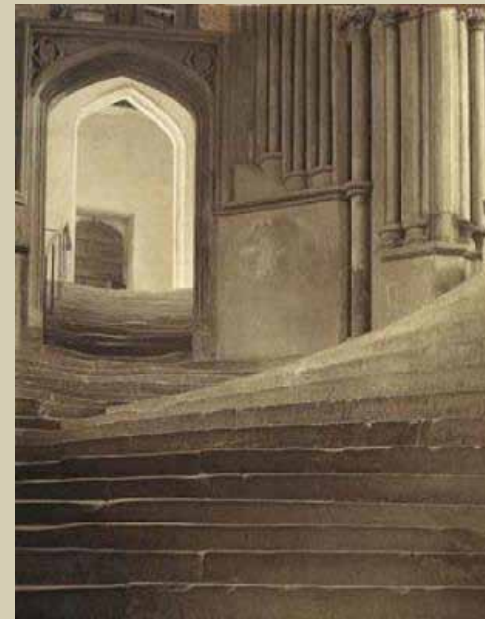

“Look out High Street” Here comes the CSW Team

Again it has been a month a bit like the Curate's Egg. Good in places started well with sunny weather which improved our activity if not speeders. We achieved 4 sessions out of the possible 6 for the month. Very few (3) booked for speeding on the B3092 as the traffic volume was extremely high, and remains so, cars rather than HGVs. The average vehicle count was in the range of 241 vehicles in the 60 minute session with 51 HGVs.

We are having quite a lot of police attention. So we can expect police visibility there on the High Street once the 3 month probationary period is over.

We have held two speeding sessions on the High Street 20MPH speed limit, regardless of not yet receiving formal consent to proceed. The first session on Wednesday lunchtime, 17th May was rather quieter than expected with only 41 vehicles passing of which only 4 were booked for speeding. Friday 19th May breakfast time was a different matter with 66 vehicles counted of which 17 were in excess of the speed limit 20MPH, in fact they averaged over 30MPH. Interestingly when the CSW team were there we noticed that most dropped down to 20MPH which confirms they are in fact aware of the 20MPH speed limit. So for at least the next CSW session we will be concentrating on high Street.

I would like to say a very big thank you to the very dedicated, very active members of the CSW team that make every effort to carry out and promote CSW activity in our village. Without their hard work we would not be able to carry out what we do.

Wiltshire Police has faced low points in the last year but it is becoming clear some of the improvements put in place are starting to deliver - and with a new leader at the helm, the Force is in safe, steady, hands.

Chief Constable Catherine Roper's drive and commitment to delivering a quality policing service to Wiltshire residents, which is contributing significantly to

Making Wiltshire Safer, has been apparent since she took the role.

Focused strategic direction introduced immediately looked to answer the criticisms in the HMICFRS PEEL report with Chief Constable Roper leading her officers, staff and volunteers from the front and with the implementation of clear priorities for the Force: Safer Public Spaces, Violence and Burglary.

Communities have been seeing focused operational work to tackle serious violence through increased engagement, highly-visible, and proactive, policing. This is alongside a commitment to attend 100% of residential burglaries. Currently, the Force detection rate for burglaries is 9.7%, which is a significant improvement, but I will always challenge for more.

I know residents want safer roads, safer communities with more police officers – this hasn't been lost on the new Chief. Significant focus has been given to consistent proactive roads policing stop checks, continued speeding enforcement in hotspots across our communities and increased engagement with all communities.

With support being given to our fantastic Community Speed Watch volunteers by the Force's Speed Enforcement Officers, and the work of the Roads Policing Unit, notices of speed awareness courses, fines and court summons have increased from 192 in 2021 to over 2,000 in 2023's first five months.

In addition, the Force recently hit government's officer recruitment targets, achieving the highest number of officers since 2010. It has also introduced a quicker, non-degree, route to get police officers through training in 20 weeks and on to our streets.

Wiltshire Police remains in the Engage process but I am confident reforms and improvements put in place by Chief will improve in those specific PEEL report areas of focus, for example: victims' service, 101 and 999 improvements, increases in justice outcomes for rape and serious sexual assault.

All of this is really promising, and excellent delivery of my police and crime plan, but I, and my office, will continue to support and challenge Chief Constable Roper to deliver on behalf of Wiltshire's residents.
