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EASTER SONG

More than 1700 years ago Saint Augustine of Hippo said of the Church, "We are an Easter people, and alleluia is our song." This is a phrase that has become so ingrained in me ever since Pope Saint John Paul II quoted it: "Do not abandon yourselves to despair. We are the Easter people and 'Hallelujah' is our song!".

The phrase has such a celebratory feeling, capturing something of what Christians experience on Easter Day (20th April this year).

Christ is risen, our life is changed forever and a natural response is to rejoice and praise God for this gift – new life undreamt of.

Yet what happens in the weeks as Easter passes? A friend rings to tell you of a close family bereavement, your child has to go into hospital, you hear that a neighbour has been burgled. What does Resurrection mean in daily life; the mixed bag of our existence with its crises, its joys and its sorrows?

This has been true from the earliest days of the Church: the apostle Thomas doubting, the Church being persecuted and having to go into hiding, the martyrdom of early Christians for their faith, disputes between Christians about the way forward, about doctrine and behaviour.

One of the most important aspects of Christianity is that it has a strong focus on hope; not a sort of blind optimism or the empty smile designed to smooth over even the most difficult situation. Rather it is something that might only be a tiny grain, a seed; with God, however, it is a distinct promise to us from an eternal future. The light of Resurrection shines in the world, however dimly it might be in some places. Our sense that God's love for creation goes to unfathomable depths makes it possible that human love can propagate like ripples across a pool.

Challenging, and emotionally draining life may be but where there is Resurrection hope there is also new life. And there are many signs of hope in our world; our hope this year for a new future for the people of the Middle east, Ukraine and Russia; our hope for fairer trade at home and abroad; our hope that fear will become a thing of the past. We may feel insignificant in the face of such need, but the message of Resurrection is that we are not. We can be bearers of hope, lighting beacons that will shine in the world's darkness. In the reality of our world, Christ has died for us and has been raised for us: "We are an Easter people, and alleluia is our song."

HOW LONG HAVE YOU LIVED IN MAIDEN BRADLEY?

We moved here at the beginning of last summer- the time has flown and we feel very lucky to have landed in such a great community.

WHAT IS THE FURTHEST YOU HAVE TRAVELLED IN YOUR LIFE AND WHY?

Under my own steam, cycling solo around the north coast of Scotland- windy, wild and wonderful landscapes! Distance-wise, probably Samoa in the Pacific Islands. I lived and worked in New Zealand for several months many years ago and went out there on a surf trip. We were surfing over coral reefs a mile or so offshore, which felt like the edge of the world. I think the furthest away / most isolated I have ever felt was a ski mountaineering trip to Svalbard with some Norwegian friends- inside the Arctic Circle with 24 hr daylight. It was an otherworldly experience.

TELL US SOMETHING ABOUT YOUR LEISURE ACTIVITIES

I grew up on a farm and have always been happiest outside. Sport has been a huge part of my life, I loved playing varsity sport at university (rugby and football) and then got really into triathlon for a while, which was great fun. Swimming, surfing and anything in the sea are right up there too. These days chasing my daughters around and seeing them find their feet and explore the natural world beats pretty much anything else. And books- I read every night.

WHAT IS YOUR EARLIEST MEMORY?

Probably being in the back of a Land Rover. My mum is a vet and used to take me out on call when she was in large animal practice.

TELL US ABOUT AN ANIMAL THAT MEANS / MEANT A LOT TO YOU

A bearded collie called Percy, who died in 2018. I did a lot of fell running and hillwalking with him throughout my teens and twenties; amazing temperament and he could run all day. I once had to scale down a cliff in the Lake District in bad weather with him tied round my shoulders and he didn't even blink. He was the greatest.

WHAT IS YOUR FAVOURITE FILM?

Big Wednesday. Iconic surf film about a group of friends coming of age in California during the Vietnam war era. I must have watched it 30 times and still get goosebumps in the opening credits!

NAME YOUR FAVOURITE RIVER / MOUNTAIN / SEA.

The Atlantic. I've always been drawn to the sea; I grew up spending summers in the Hebrides in Scotland, and Emma and I got married by the coast in north Cornwall- some of my happiest moments have been spending time in the sea with our eldest daughter down there. Favourite river: the Skirfare, a trout stream in the Yorkshire Dales. Favourite mountain: a tie between Helvellyn in the Lake District and Beinn Alligin in the northwest Highlands.

TELL US SOME THINGS YOU LIKE ABOUT THE VILLAGE / AREA.

Walking up Brimsdown Hill in the early morning or towards dusk. The beech trees on Back Lane (and the ancient ash in the valley below Manor Farm), the community garden, Saturday morning kids Olympics at the park with the Hendys leading the charge, and the awesome team at the Pantry. The surrounding landscape is magical- lovely rolling country and the feeling of a very old landscape.

FAVOURITE SEASON?

Spring. I love it when the swallows come back.

WHAT OR WHO HAS INSPIRED YOU IN YOUR LIFE?

On an individual level, my dad. I am the only son of an only son, and we were very close. He was an artist and a bit of a polymath, he and mum bought a ruined smallholding in the South Pennines in Yorkshire in the early 70s (where I was born and grew up) and renovated it single handedly over many years. He was equally at home on a rugby pitch, waist deep in a field drain or in the Louvre. He could do anything with his hands, he never stopped learning and had time for anybody. He died very suddenly in 2018 but he's up there somewhere and he continues to inspire me.

TELL US ABOUT A HIGHLIGHT IN YOUR LIFE.

My family. We have two wonderful daughters, and I share a house with three strong willed women! I would be nowhere and nothing without them.

WHAT IS THE BEST BOOK YOU HAVE READ AND WHY DID YOU LIKE IT?

Tough one to call, but The Count of Monte Christo - I read it during my law school finals and could not put it down. Breathless plot, intricate characterisation and a sense that there is always light in the darkness. A cracker.

LIFE ON THE FARM - APRIL 2025

As the days gradually get longer, Spring bursts into bloom

Spring sowing and drilling continues

Spring beans, maize, oats also potato, peas and

other root crops

Preparation for hay or silage harvesting

LIVESTOCK

Calving continues until May with the new-borns having their ears tagged and passports applied for movement purposes: a reminder that there is always a lot of paperwork and office work these days in farming.

Farmers also have to keep a careful eye in the fields with lambs vulnerable to predators both wild and occasionally domestic.

POULTRY FLOCKS

Continue to monitor poultry flocks for signs of Bird Flu

Continue to check and inspect all the pastures that stock will be turned out to see that they are safe and secure

HEDGEHOGS

We don't often see Erinaceus (Hedgehog) they are nocturnal creatures. Seeing them in the daytime may suggest something is wrong and more often than not we see them in the headlamps of a car at night or dead on the road. Living in The Rank we have played host to a number of prickly visitors to our hedgehog feeding stations during the spring, summer, and autumn.

They hold a fascination for me, and having rescued a number of them over the years. More recently I rescued two specimens. The first one a fairly mature hedgehog lying spreadeagled by the entrance to the recreation ground in Maiden Bradley clearly it was in a state of distress, I gathered it up, and bought it home. Using gloves handled it carefully and popped it into a high sided stout cardboard box with a water supply using a metal jam jar cap as a water container. I later introduce some wet dog food. The hedgehog was rallying and the following morning it seemed to be in a far better condition than when I discovered it. The water had largely been drunk and the dog food was almost all gone. It was decided to seek advice from Prickles Rescue Centre at Cheddar (07806744772) . Explaining the situation, they asked me to take the hog into them. This I did and learned quickly that weight is all important. They kept my specimen beast for a couple of days and fed and watered her well. She was examined for obvious wounds. I got a call from them and returned to collect the hedgehog and came home with a pair about the same age, which I happily released into the wild.

The second rescue was just about the same location a much smaller specimen and clearly struggling. I bought it home and weighed it in at 450 grams, clearly not satisfactory as we were still several weeks from hibernation. At hibernation the hedgehog should weigh in at around 650 grams. I took this one directly to Prickles at Cheddar and they said it would have been unlikely to have made it through the next hibernation. 650 grams would be a good weight for a pre hibernation condition.

Spring has arrived, they may be awake and foraging in your garden, they need your help, treat them to a little Spikes hedgehog food. Put a small dish of food in a discreet corner of your garden away from cats and dogs. Spikes can be purchased over the counter or from Amazon where I get mine.

They do have predators, badgers are the main culprits.

So please give our prickly friends a helping hand this Spring. I have started feeding my visiting hedgehogs, they come for the violet oil beetles and migrating common frogs and a top up at one of our feeding stations.

If you find one in distress take it to a hedgehog rescue centre and just give some water in the meanwhile. Do not treat them with any medication let the experts help them.

JOBS FOR THE GARDEN:

- Prune cherries and plums now they are growing, once the leaf buds have opened
- Plant potatoes, asparagus crowns, peas, Jerusalem artichoke tubers, globe artichokes, onion sets and garlic
- Cosmos and field poppies can be sown to fill gaps in your borders
- Sow your summer veg seeds but keep them in seed trays inside until after the frosts. In Maiden Bradley that is probably not till May!

MAIDEN BRADLEY PARISH COUNCIL PRECEPT 2025/2026

What is the Maiden Bradley Parish Council Precept?

The precept is an amount of money that the Parish Council uses in many ways.

It is shown as a line on your council tax bill as Maiden Bradley and Yarnfield Parish Council.

Every year the Parish Council prepares a budget for all the things that need doing in the village. This can be ongoing tasks from year to year and also new projects that the village might want to start.

There is a public meeting where the Parish Council announce what the precept will be for the following year.

This total figure is the amount that we apply for from Wiltshire Council.

How is the precept money spent?

Areas covered are for example-

- Grass cutting of the Recreation Ground, Back Lane, Jubilee Garden, The Knapp and other areas under Parish Council control.
- Maintenance and insurance of the defibrillator.
- Maintenance of the Speed Indicator Devices.
- Maintenance and insurance of the children's play area.
- Maintenance and signage of stiles and public footpaths.
- Repairs to areas under Parish Council control such as the fencing around The Knapp.
- Grant making to village clubs and organisations.
- Projects put forward by the village.

We also have a legal requirement to have a reserve amount of 50% of the precept as a safety net.

What is the precept for 2025/2026?

The precept for 2024/2025 was kept at 0% on the previous year.

The precept for 2025/2026 will be +2% on 2024/2025.

The total is £30309 for the village.

The increase is due to inflation, increased costs of wages for the Parish Clerk, insurances, grounds maintenance costs etc.

The +2% means an increase per household over the previous year of £8.

SEPTEMBER HOUSE

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EASTER BISCUITS

INGREDIENTS:

100g butter
75g caster sugar
1 egg, separated
1 small lemon finely zested
200g plain flour
50g currants
1-2 tbsp milk
Makes 16 biscuits



STEP 1:

Preheat the oven to 200 degrees/ 180 degrees fan/ gas 6 and line two baking sheets with baking paper.

STEP 2:

Cream together the butter and sugar in a large bowl until pale and fluffy. Add the egg yolk, lemon zest, sift in the flour and mix well to combine. Add the currents and 1 tbsp of milk and mix with a round-ended table knife to form a soft dough, adding more milk if needed. Use your hands to bring it into a ball.

STEP 3:

Knead the dough on a lightly floured surface then using a rolling pin, roll out the dough to about 5mm thick. Use your fluted 6cm pastry cutter to stamp out 16 biscuits, re-rolling it as necessary. Place each disc on the baking sheets.

STEP 4:

Bake the biscuits in the oven for about 8 mins. While they are cooking lightly beat the egg white with a fork until frothy. Remove the biscuits and brush the tops with egg white, then sprinkle sugar over the top. Return them to the oven for a further 15 mins or until golden.

STEP 5:

Leave to cool on the baking sheets for a few minutes before moving them to a wire rack.

Against an average overall vehicle count of 40 to 50 vehicles in the given 45 minutes. All cars and a few light vans. Averaging 28/31 MPH. 90% of which appears to be commuter traffic who have scant regard.
